FBYC Sailors Cruise the Turkish Coast

Fishing Bay Yacht Club burgees were flying from the spreaders of six boats cruising the Turkish Coast this past May. The trip involved six FBYC skippers and their mostly FBYC crews and was skillfully put together by Wayland and Maggie Rennie. Approximately half of the group spent three days touring mainland Greece and the Greek island of Samos before joining the rest of the group in Kusadasi, Turkey. 21 strong, the group commenced a 21 day odyssey, touring Ephesus, Priene and Bodrum before arriving at Marmaris, where three more travelers joined the group and we picked up the boats. From Marmaris, on the Aegean Sea, we commenced an eight day sailing trip along Turkey's renowned "Turquois Coast" to Finike, on the Mediterranean Coast with overnight stopovers at Ekinicik, Goecek, Kalkan, Kas and Kekova Roads before turning in the boats at Finike.

There are several options for sailing Turkish waters. Our group chose a "bareboat" charter where we provisioned the boats, provided crew and were more or less free to go where we wanted to go. The six boats were 42–45 feet long.

Perhaps the best reason to cruise the Aegean and Mediterranean coasts of Turkey is that they remain, for now, unspoiled. The majority of the anchorages are deserted bays and coves or beside small villages. The water is some of the cleanest and least polluted of any in the Med.

This beautiful mountainous coastline is a wild and rugged region where steep rocky mountains are split by ravines and plummet into the sea. In ancient times, it was a coast feared by mariners and even today this coast is not a friendly one to sailors. It presents a decidedly hostile aspect from seaward, but also some of the most majestic, almost primeval scenery that you may encounter in Turkish waters.

The trip was a virtual journey back in time. Interspersed among this rugged scenery are the remains of ancient sites, attesting to Turkey's strategic position at the crossroads of the Occident and the Orient: Hellinistic and Roman theatres, baths and aqueducts, Byzantine churches richly decorated in mosaics, fortified Crusader castles, Seljuck and Ottoman Mosques, palaces and elegant harem quarters. We visited nine ruined ancient city sites, some dating back 2600 vears.

The trip culminated with a three day stay in Istanbul, during which we took a boat cruise along the Bosphorus, the 20 mile long straights between the Sea of Marmara to the Black Sea which divides Europe from Asia.

Wayland and Maggie did a magnificent job organizing this and every aspect went off beautifully. One skipper was heard exclaiming, "the weather was perfect, the water aqua blue, and to walk where Saint Paul walked was just inspiring!

The official name of the Labor Day regatta is the Stingray Point Regatta for the Brent Halsey Jr. Memorial Trophy. Yet to date only a portion of the competitors have been able to compete for the award on any given year because it rotated between PHRF and MORC from year to year. A change has been proposed that would open the competition to every entrant.

The winner would be the boat which has been the most competitive as measured both by the number of boats against which they have competed and the degree to which they have consistently been at or close to the top of their class. It wouldn't neces-

sarily be the winner of the largest class and provisions would be made to allow for differences in case one or more classes completed a different number of races. Once places are determined within the class the winner of each class or subdivision would be entered in a comparison against the others using a set formula.

The wording is being finalized and the formula being checked. They will be included with skippers packages and the Special Sailing Instructions which will be available at registration and perhaps published on the website. Check it out and see if it doesn't make things a bit more interesting.
