Wayland Rennie and crew of Trilogy find success in Turkey Shoot

76 boats in seven fleets race in regatta to benefit Hospice

The weather, beautiful classic yachts, fun-loving people and proud skippers came together last weekend for the annual Hospice Turkey Shoot regatta.

The three-day event opened Friday with a happy hour where sailors and spectators met the honorary chairs, Larry and Lin Pardey, internationally known for their circumnavigations of the world in boats without engines.

Two boats built by the Pardeys competed in the regatta. Larry Pardey skippered the Talesin of Victoria and William Tillett of Beaufort, N.C., skippered the Seraffyn of Victoria.

In all, 76 boats divided into seven fleets competed in races on Saturday. Temperatures were in the high 70s; winds were light and variable.

Participants returned from a day of sailing on the Rappahannock River to Yankee Point Sailboat Marina, where Diana and Mike Gadwill of Kinsale had prepared a pig roast. Dozens of Hospice, Yankee Point Yacht Club and marina volunteers served some 400 dinners.

Race winners the first day kept their boats moving by going out of their way to find patches of wind. Rounding marks proved nerveracking as boats bunched up due to light winds and lost steerage. Starts were relatively good with humorous moments due to wind variability.

At one point, Dave Perusluha's skipjack, Calico Jack, was seen backing from the starting line as his genoa-sail backwinded. Skipjacks, among the oldest design in the regatta, performed well this year. Perusluha is the yard manager at Yankee Point Marina.

The Sunday lineup featured a pursuit race, which was shortened due to lack of winds. In a pursuit race, the slower boats are given a head start and the faster boats try to catch them.

Nearly 40 boats formed almost a straight line stretching across the river as they raced for a mark near Towles Point.

Spectators aboard The Tides' Miss Ann were treated to a spectacular sight. Some boats were flying multicolor spinnakers, some had twin head sails and others were sailing wing on wing with the mainsail to one side and the jib to the other.

Wayland Rennie of Richmond, aboard Trilogy, claimed first place overall. Gerry Latell of Irvington aboard Ozone placed second and Bruce Gibbs of Lancaster aboard Alice was third.

Rennie also finished first in the red fleet. Chet Bradley of Heathsville aboard Patti was second and William Broaddus of Richmond aboard Spindrift, third.

Lee Williams of Lancaster aboard Poe Bird won the blue fleet. Philip Denvir of Irvington aboard Frenzy was second, and John McConnico of Merry Point aboard Country Woman was third.

Latell finished first in the white fleet. Randy Alderks of Lancaster aboard Eroica was second and Jay Rohman of Lancaster aboard Esperanza was third.

Maurice Dickerson of Irvington aboard Sharp Tern won the gray fleet. Cameron Blandsford of Lancaster aboard Myst was second and Billie McCarty of Lancaster was third.

Robert Douglas of Richmond aboard Shearwater won the purple fleet. James Charbeneau of Lancaster aboard Mietje was second and Richard Moser of West Point aboard Therapee was third.

Gibbs finished first in the yellow fleet. Frank Birdsall of White Stone aboard Black Rainbow was second and David McCaleb of Lancaster aboard Cygnet was third.

Robert Means of Urbanna aboard Gecko III won the green fleet. Stan Crockett of Irvington aboard Miss Daisy was second and Jack Chamberlain of Lancaster aboard Now What was third.

A greater variety of classic boats participated in the event than in years past. Some of the yachts, including a 60-foot schooner, did not race.

Older boats competing in the races included a 22-foot catboat built in 1923, Catawampus, skippered by Mark
Hollingsworth of Irvington; a 43-foot Concordia yacht built in 1937, Wild Rose, skippered by Tom Martin of Richmond, and a 38-foot Devereaux ketch built in 1939, Kildeer, skippered by Dan Hutton of Cooks Landing Marina.

Nick England of Burgess aboard Virginia won the Miss Ann's Choice trophy for the most beautiful yacht in the regatta.

Hospice Services of the Northern Neck thanked the participants and the many local businesses, organizations and individuals who supported the annual Turkey Shoot Regatta.



US Laser Masters Regatta



The club was at it's best as 91 competitors arrived from all points of the compass for the Millenium US Masters Regatta October 13-15. Charter boats arrived on a 12 boat trailer, one boat from South Carolina was towed behind a Honda motorcycle and two arrived from St Mary's on the back of a converted work boat. Many drove long hours from Austin Texas, Ontario and Florida while others came by air from California, Salt Lake City, St Petersburg, Nova Scotia and Munich, Germany. Our appeal attests to our site, the reputation we have for hospitality, and not least, to providing what has been described by one of our regular attendees as the "best yacht club food" in the country. The most memorable event, and if you were not there to see it you would not believe it, was the way the porch in the soon to be demolished clubhouse looked for the Saturday dinner. Would you believe 135 visitors, their partners and hosts and some few volunteers were seated with white covers on all the tables? Chef Alain's helpers dressed in white aprons and chef's hats added to the atmosphere. Nobody cared that we used paper table cloths, plastic cutlery and paper cups for the wine. And hear this, we had a fabulous meal to follow an equally memorable dinner on the Friday evening. Talk about value for monies paid!

What about the racing? The best conditions, perhaps 4-5 knots, were found by the early birds Thursday afternoon. It was downhill from there as we were stuck in

a high pressure zone for at least the next three days. The race committe took the fleet to Hills Bay Friday noon, and east of Stove Point later in the afternoon and got in two races. Saturday afternoon they got in a third race just north of Hills Bay after three general recalls and multiple DSO's under the Black Flag rule. Sunday was more of the same with just one race. One novelty, while waiting for wind on Saturday, was to watch an Olympic sailing video, followed by lunch all carefully bagged for on the water delivery outside Fishing Bay.

This Laser Masters group is comprised of a core team that meet one another anywhere in the world where Masters regattas are held. Over the past two years this has been Australia, Holland, Switzerland and Mexico. And next year it will be Cork in the Irish Republic. Those who sail closer to home travel the east coast from Florida to New England and our friends from Texas and Ontario join us for major regattas. The group is in many ways one big happy family, supporting one another on and off the water wherever they see a need. And there is rarely any problem in getting club members to volunteer to support these Master Regattas, perhaps because we tell them they'll get to see 90 boats on a starting line, which has to be a memorable sight even when it's done in slow

motion.

The overall winner was Chris Raab from Alamitos Bay Yacht Club in California with Joe van Rossem from Ajax, Ontario second followed by Kevin Kelley from Wilton, Connecticut. Complete results were published on the FBYC Club web site at http://FBYCLaserFleet.Tripod.com/masters.htm

Chris Raab at 43 is a regular winner in Laser regattas as is Joe van Rossem who won the Atlantic Coast Masters at Fishing Bay in 1997 and 1999. Joe is scheduled for hip replacement surgery and if you see him off the water you'd wonder how he could manage to move around a Laser. But he does just that. And interestingly Kevin Kelley learned to sail locally while his father was on the staff at Christchurch School. He tells us most of his early sailing was around Gwynns Island. One final aside, there were three former world champions sailing, together with the President, Vice President and Secretary of the North American Laser Class Association and the President of Vanguard Sailboats, the US Laser manufacturer.


