(*reported by David Hazlehurst*) - The date of the next membership meeting is April 8, 2001 at 6:30 at Lud Kimbrough's home. Second notices went out on February 24 to 48 members who had not paid 2001 dues/ fees. As of today, there are 27 delinquent members.

TREASURER - Mason Chapman - Treasurer's report presented. The fundraising program continues and we hope to have participation from the entire membership

LOG STREAMER - Tom Roberts (*reported by David Hazlehurst*) – Sixteen members contributed articles or notices to last month's Log.

DOCKS - Debbie Cycotte (reported by David Hazlehurst) – There are two slips available and both may be rented in the next month or so. Debbie is still looking for a manual hoist for launching dinghies. SOCIAL - Mike Calkins - Mike thanked Sam Stoakley for a great Bermuda High Party. Mike asked that e-mail notices be sent to the membership about Opening Day. WINTER PROGRAMS - John Koedel (reported by Judy Buis) - The wine tasting with Gary Jobson will be held on March 23, with all proceeds going to the Leukemia Society.

<u>NEW BUILDING CHR. - Judy Buis</u> – We now have a construction permit and as soon as the soil test results come back, the slab can be poured. Also, the construction fence is not up yet. John Koedel, Jr. will use his video camera to track the progress of the construction.

LONG RANGE PLANNING – Waddy Garrett – Waddy announced that the Stull property is on the market. Waddy also reported that we now have the five permits required for the Jackson Creek dredging project. He will meet with the Flag Officers to determine the next step.

VICE COMMODORE - DICK COLE Dick Cole advised that all of the books are now at the publishers. The books will be mailed first class this year to get them to the membership before Opening Day.

FLEET CAPTAIN - Gordon Nelson -Gordon has been in touch with Paul Howle about possible dates for training aboard *Mr*. *Roberts* since the boat will not be in the water during MORC crew training. Gordon and Debbie Cycotte are working on the Green Book Rules concerning insurance requirements for boats in slips.

OFFSHORE DIV. CDR. - Stuart Burnett – Stuart discussed some of the changes in the US Sailing Rules and advised that they will not be used until next year. When asked about using the new Rules in the fall, Stuart said the earliest we could consider doing so is in the Frostbite Series.

ONE DESIGN DIV. CDR. – Jim Black – Jim advised that the "old" starting Rules will be used for the early regattas and the "new" starting Rules may be used later in the season. There are still some openings for race committee to be filled.

CRUISING DIV. CDR. - Sam Stoakley – Sam reported that 71 people attended the Bermuda High Party on February 23.

1. <u>OptiKids (sailors age 6-8)</u> Class will be held the 2 weekends prior to Junior Week- June 9, 10, 16 &17th. The class will be half days, and students will attend classes on all 4 days. **One parent** MUST accompany each student.

2. <u>Beginning Opti (sailors age 9 or 10)</u> You'll be sailing that Opti like a pro—with the help of a friend. **Two kids** in each boat will learn basic sailing skills while having FUN!

3. <u>Intermediate Opti (sailors age 10 or 11)</u> You've already learned the basics in the Beginning Opti Class last year. Now you're going to **sail alone**! You'll have lots of fun and learn a little more about getting the boat their first!

4. <u>Racing Classes (sailors age 11 or over)</u> You've completed Intermediate. You know how to get that boat going, but you want to get there **faster**! Bring your Opti, Byte, or Laser and learn from some of the best in your class. Maybe you'll join the FBYC Racing Team (you get your own T-shirt ⁽²⁾) and have fun racing with other kids your age at our club, or at other clubs around the Chesapeake Bay.

5. <u>Team Sailing Class (sailors age 12 and over; or who have completed Intermediate Sailing Class).</u> We'll spend time **sailing with our friends** and try new stuff as a team. Members are again offering to let us use their Mobjacks for the class. We might even have more 420s. Tell your FBYC friends to meet you in the Team Sailing Class!

PARENTS: Usual progression in Junior Week goes like this:

1. OptiKids 2. Beginning Opti 3. Intermediate Opti,

4. then either Racing or Advanced Sailing Class

If you weren't lucky enough to start your child's sailing career at age 6, select the class which seems age and skill level appropriate (call me if you have questions). Over age 11, with no sailing experience (deprived children!), I would recommend Advanced Sailing Class—they'll learn quickly!

Junior Week Parent Jobs—during OptiKids Weekends and Junior Week Many hands make the work easy!

-Power Boat Operations – Insure boats are refueled each day and operational.

-T-shirt Distribution — Insure T-shirts are distributed to the various sections on the last day of instruction for OptiKids and Junior Week.

-Check-in at FBYC for the "check-in" period the first morning of instruction for OptiKids. For Junior Week, "check-in" will be held the Sunday prior to the start of Junior Week and the first morning of instruction for approximately 1 hour each time. Check-in will be for the purpose of collecting medial and liability forms, and any outstanding payments.

-Photographer — takes 'action shots' of students during instruction. Make photos available to parents during the class sessions. Arrange for group photo for both OptiKids and Junior Week participants, and make available to members at their expense.

-Social — Coordinate and execute any social activity chosen! Acquire and insure secure distribution of daily snacks for each section.

-Large Dingy Launching — Responsible for launching One Design Boats loaned to the program by members for use in the Team Sailing Class. This is done before classes start each day.

-Doctor of the Day — (Pre-requisite: must be a doctor!) serve as Doc of the Day for one day of Junior Week or OptiKids.

-Parent of the Day — Carries hand held radio to communicate with each class. Familiar with phone locations at the club. Handle minor medical problems (mostly nettles or 'windy day' induced stomachaches^(D)) Contact Doc of the Day if necessary. Has access to all medical forms and liability release forms if necessary for medical evacuation of students. Contact parents if necessary.



The new rules become effective April 1 and rule books will be mailed to USSA members currently scheduled to arrive from the printers on May 1. Those few FBYC members who attended the CCV Rules Clinic in Hampton on March 26 heard this firsthand along with a discussion on other rule changes.

The Basic Principles, Rules 1-5, have not changed but Rule 3 bears repeating.

Sportsmanship and the Rules now reads

"competitors in the sport of sailing are governed by a body of RULES that they are expected to follow AND enforce. A fundamental principle of sportsmanship is that when competitors break a rule they will promptly take a penalty or retire".
