Happy New Year!

Both individuals and organizations often begin a new year by establishing goals and objectives to focus on during the upcoming year. During the December board meeting, I introduced Five Key Objectives to focus on this year. I would like to take a minute and share objectives we have for 2005. Some of the objectives carry forward from prior years, some will continue into future years. For those objectives that will spill over into future years, we want to establish continuity as we transition to a new board. We want to ensure work accomplished but not completed is not lost during a

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transition period. I plan to refer to these Key Objectives and monitor progress throughout the year. For each of the Key Objectives we will have a Champion who is responsible for its execution. Each objective also has a Timeline. Objectives, Champions, and Timelines have been all established and agreed upon.

2005 Five Key Objectives Club Management & Operations

This objective has three components. The first is personnel, specifically our Deltaville employee(s). We will review dollars spent vs. value members receive. Second, review and update spending controls in all areas of the club with a concentrated focus on problem areas from last year. And third, provide board members with timely and meaningful financial tools so they can effectively manage their areas of responsibility. The Champion is Allan Heyward who plans to have meaningful recommendations in place by March in time for our season when increased spending begins.

Long Range Planning

Two years ago a committee led by Waddy Garrett did significant work developing a ten year plan. Last year we were not able to complete the plan because resources were focused on land acquisition. The plan needs to be updated based on recent changes to the club, it needs to be accepted by the board and published for the membership. The

Champion is Strother Scott, who plans to complete this task by the end of September.

Capital Planning (Five Year Outlook)

Our Club has some significant Capital Expenses on the horizon. The Finance Committee meets each fall, attempts to estimate costs and time horizons for major projects. This year we hope to be a little more scientific in our approach. For example, we need to better understand our bulkhead situation. When will they fail? Is it feasible to repair over stages, or are we forced to repair all at once? When repair is required, will we have the funds allocated, or will we have to borrow? Other significant capital projects include One Design Dock expense and replacement of the Sea Craft. We want a thorough plan focused on managing down our debt and planning for upcoming capital projects. The Champion for this Objective has not yet been finalized, but the timeline has. The Finance Committee will need the information before they begin to meet in the fall.

New Land Development

During 2004, Strother Scott Chaired the Short Range New Land Planning Committee. A significant amount of time, energy and effort was devoted to the plan, which can be found on the web site. The plan is very detailed and has five se-


Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Commodore Jay Buhl.

REAR COMMODORE-ALLAN HEYWARD

<u>SECRETARY</u> – The following resolutions were presented by the Secretary and approved by the Board:

RESOLUTION to open and inspect the contents of the Safe Deposit Box at First Market Bank.

RESOLUTION to vote into Honor-



ary Membership the Fishing Bay Yacht Club's Deltaville neighbors -Mr. Billy Moseley, Mrs. Edith Moseley, Mr. Edward E. Ralston, and Mr. J. B. Richardson.

RESOLUTION to vote into membership all children who have reached 10 years of age by January 1, 2005.

TREASURER – Paul Howle reported that the term loan for the purchase of the new property was executed with First Market Bank. He urged Board members to watch their budgets closely in 2005.

DOCKS – Ric Bauer has made some minor numbering changes on four slips. He is assessing the cost of moving five pilings and will also look into the dock wiring and possible upgrades to old outlets on the middle and west docks. Club volunteers made minor adjustments and completely serviced the drysail hoist. Ric thanked Brad Ward, Wes Jones and Paul Andersen for their help. Signage for the hoist relating to proper use and specific notification to all small boat owners (under 6,000 lbs.) will be issued.

LONG RANGE PLANNING -Strother Scott presented the Final Short Range Planning Committee Report relating to the use of the new land. The report outlined in detail all of the recommendations, which were then broken down into five Phases. Phase 1 pertained to the preliminary "do-it-ourselves" items; Phase 2 pertained to the major Dirt Contractor items; Phase 3 pertained to landscaping items; Phase 4 pertained to the pool steps and concrete decking; and Phase 5 pertained to improvements to the stable. The committee recommended that the Board authorize getting started on Phase 1 and Phase 2 as soon as possible. With special thanks to Strother for his work chairing the committee and

<u>WEBMASTER</u> – Strother Scott presented a report designed to inform the new Board members how the web site works and how it can be used as a tool in carrying out their job duties.

WINTER PROGRAMS – Cam Hoggan has two winter programs planned. The first program, set for February 4 at St. Christopher's Middle School, features best selling author Dean King. The second program will be held on March 25 as a benefit for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. The speaker will be Gary Jobson.

<u>HISTORIAN</u> – Jere Dennison advised that a group of Danny Austin's friends ("Friends of Dan") are planning to donate a fitting memorial to him at FBYC. Danny's

widow has offered to contribute his extensive collection of sailing books to the club but there is no suitable place at the present time that can serve as a club library. Therefore, Friends of Dan propose a plan to install an appropriate bookcase in the main clubhouse at no cost to the club and identify the location as the "Daniel L. Austin Memorial Library of the Fishing Bay Yacht Club." The proposed location is in the office adjacent to the landing on the second floor. We currently have some books donated by Charlie McDowell and other members have books that they also wish to donate. Only books with marine topics will be accepted. The proposal has the concurrence of the Memorial Committee comprised of the House Chair, Grounds Chair and Historian, and the Board approved a motion to accept the proposal.

<u>VICE COMMODORE – LUD H.</u> KIMBROUGH, III

Lud reported that the role of Operations Manager has been a challenging one and the required job duties have evolved substantially over the past year. The consensus is that there is no way that one employee can handle everything that should be done based on our current facility and property needs. Therefore, the Finance Committee included funds in the 2005 budget to hire a part-time Club Manager. Included in the duties of the Club Manager are overseeing the Operations Manager, managing the club facilities, dealing with visiting guests and coordinating details of major events between Event Chairs and the Operations Manager. Ric Bauer, John Koedel Jr., and Chip Hall, who served on the committee that made this recommendation, have developed a job description. An advertisement for the position will be run in the Deltaville area. A notice will also appear in the <u>Log</u> and a notice will be sent to members by e-mail.

FLEET CAPTAIN - Elizabeth Staas reported that scheduling of the 2005 Sailing Events is well underway. Tom Roberts has accepted the role of managing the schedule for FBYC and that of the Southern Bay as well. Elizabeth plans to have the completed Sailing Events Book to the publisher by January 23. Elizabeth asked the Board to discuss action for the almost defunct Byte Class because the class no longer meets the requirements to qualify for Active Fleet status. The Board approved a motion to place the Byte Fleet on Probationary status. The Byte Fleet will be notified of this step.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION -

Sharon Bauer reported that three of the 2005 Fleet Captains have been picked. FBYC will host John McCarthy for a seminar on racing rules and race management on March 12 in the auditorium of the Mutual Building at 9th and Main in Richmond.

FLEET LT. – Brooks Zerkel advised that *Mr. Roberts* is out of the water.

CBYRA DELEGATE – Tom Roberts attended the CBYRA Annual Meeting at Gibson Island. In the next few weeks, he will go to Rappahannock Yacht Club to coordinate our schedule with theirs and also to Hampton Yacht Club for the same purpose. Tom is Region IV Vice-President of CBYRA.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u> – Jay Buhl read a thank you card from Wayland Rennie concerning the club's memorial donation to the Chesapeake Bay Foundation in Maggie Rennie's memory.

Jay Buhl presented his five Key Objectives for 2005, some of which will be ongoing in future years (<u>see</u> "Message from the Commodore").

Each of the Objectives has a Champion for executing the Objective and there is a timeline for each. They are as follows:

Letter written to Commodore John M. Buhl, III

December 12, 2004

I want to thank you, the Board, and the membership of Fishing Bay Yacht Club for making me an Honorary Member.

I feel strong emotional connections to the club. Some may remember my grandparents, Edith and Beverly Hancock, my Nana and Pop. They were neighbors of the club in the early days and I spent much time with them. My summers were spent running around barefoot on the club grounds and netting crabs from the pilings of the pier. I learned to sail on a leaky wooden Sailfish that I owned with my brother Jimmy. I won one trophy. It was a small plastic cup, sort of beige in color.

Some will remember my father, Marshall Moseley. He was with the club when it was in Urbanna and the Hampton was the boat of choice.

FBYC History....

The Day Old Dixie Died

Not to worry, this is not a Civil War story. Desperately perusing some old Logs for a January topic (I am running out of material, folks, so send me some ideas if you have 'em), I came across the following notice in the October, 1960 Log about Murray Clark's acquisition of one of the Club's most handsome yachts, the Dixie. And she came to a most spectacular end while anchored off the Club later in the decade.

Dixie Finds a Home in Dixie

Forty-five years ago (circa 1915), Rueben Huiseler, a famous Down East builder watched one of his creations slide down the ways into the waters off Nova Scotia. She was a 42-foot gaff rigged sloop named **Dixie**. It took Murray Clark to bring this long legged (she draws 6 and a half feet) beauty to the land for which she was named.

As he is in all things, Murray is modest about Dixie, but there's a twinkle in his eye when he says, "She has the 5^{th} highest handicap on the Chesapeake."

And this boat was truly a beauty as I vividly recall: wooden with a low freeboard, long bowsprit, gaff rigged with cotton sails. And fast too: she was purported to have won her class in the Bermuda race sometime back in the 1920s. Accommodations were sparse for a 42-footer for she was designed and built solely for speed and winning races.

Talk about an anachronism. The decade of the 1960s was accentuated by the swift transition from older wooden racing yachts to the mass-produced fiberglass variety. I suppose Murray was swimming against the tide, but he knew a classic when he saw it and couldn't pass up the opportunity to acquire this stunning head-turner. Too bad that she is not still around to compete in the Turkey Shoot Regatta for vintage yachts at the Yankee Point Yacht Club where she would still be a winner.

Later in the decade of the 1960s, she was anchored off the Club facilities on Fishing Bay when disaster struck. While the alcohol stove was cranked up to cook a meal, the fire got out of control and, in spectacular fashion, Fishing Bay filled with black smoke and a bright, orange blaze. Fortunately the crew was able to abandon her without injury while the sirens on the Deltaville Volunteer Fire Department trucks wailed as they rolled down Fishing Bay Road. *Dixie* was pretty much gutted by this conflagration but she didn't sink so was towed away to her ignoble fate.

Recently I ran into Sandy Clark, Murray Clark's son, who promised to provide me with a picture of *Dixie* for Log. I hope he will follow through with his promise, and, if so, I promise to include it in a future issue.

The Finance Committee developed a budget approved by the Board which allows the SRP Plan to be executed over a two year time period, progression subject to Flag approval. Phase 1 includes many "do it yourself" projects with minimal expense to the Club. Phase 2 involves greater expense to the club but will not be executed until the 2005 revenue picture becomes clear. Chip Hall will Champion the execution of the phased plan during 2005 and 2006.

This objective should remain for FBYC well into the future. David Hazlehurst will focus on club participation for the next two years, and make a recommendation how we maintain focus into the future.

Vigor's Interdenominational Boat Denaming Ceremony

A denaming ceremony should consist of five parts: an invocation, an expression of gratitude, a supplication, a rededication and a libation.

First, you must remove all physical traces of the boat's old name. Take the old logbook ashore, along with any other papers that bear the old name. Check for offending books and charts with the name inscribed. Be ruthless. Sand away the old name from the lifebuoys, transom, topside, dinghy, and oars. Yes, sand it away. Painting over is not good enough. You are dealing with gods here, you understand, not mere dumb mortals. If the old name is carved or etched, try to remove it or, at the very minimum, fill it in with putty and then paint over. And don't place the new name anywhere on the boat before the denaming ceremony is carried out. That's just tempting fate.

How you conduct the ceremony depends entirely on you. If you are the theatrical type, and enjoy appearing in public in your yacht club blazer and skipper's cap, you can read it with flair on the foredeck before a gathering of distinguished guests. But if you find this whole business faintly silly and embarrassing, and only go along with it because you're scared to death of what might happen if you don't, you can skulk down below and mumble it on your own. That's perfectly okay. The main thing is that you carry it out. The words must be spoken.

The last part of the ceremony, the libation, must be performed at the bow, just as it is in a naming ceremony. There are two things to watch out for here. Don't use cheap-cheap champagne, and don't try to keep any for yourself. Buy a second bottle if you want some. Use a brew that's reasonably expensive, based on your ability to pay, and pour the whole lot on the boat. One of the things the gods of the sea despise most is meanness; so don't try to do this bit on the cheap.

What sort of time period should elapse between this denaming ceremony and a new naming ceremony? There's no fixed time. You can do the renaming right after the denaming, or you can wait at least 24 hours to give any lingering demons a chance to clear out.

Vigor's Denaming Ceremony

"In the name of all who have sailed aboard this ship in the past, and in the name of all who may sail aboard her in the future, we invoke the ancient gods of the wind and the sea to favor us with their blessing today. "Mighty Neptune, king of all that moves in or on the waves; and mighty Aeolus (pronounced EE-oh-lus), guardian of the winds and all that blows before them,

"We offer you our thanks for the protection you have afforded this vessel in the past. We voice our gratitude that she has always found shelter from tempest and storm and enjoyed safe passage to port.

"Now, wherefore we submit this supplication, that the name whereby this vessel has hitherto been known [<u>name of your boat</u>], be struck and removed from your records.

"Further, we ask that when she is again presented for blessing with another name, she shall be recognized and shall be accorded once again the selfsame privileges she previously enjoyed.

"In return for which, we re-dedicate this vessel to your domain in full knowledge that she shall be subject as always to the immutable laws of the gods of the wind and the sea.

"In consequence whereof, and in good faith, we seal this pact with a libation offered according to the hallowed ritual of the sea."

Christening Ceremony

After a boat is denamed, you simply need to rename it using the traditional christening ceremony, preferably with Queen Elizabeth breaking a bottle of champagne on the bow, and saying the words: "I name this ship [new name of your boat] and may she bring fair winds and good fortune to all who sail on her."

Alternate Christening Ceremony


Someone with a strong voice, preferably who can impersonate Richard Burton, starts off by saying: "For thousands of years, we have gone to sea. We have crafted vessels to carry us and we have called them by name. These ships will nurture and care for us through perilous seas, and so we affectionately call them "she." To them we toast, and ask to celebrate [new name of your boat]." Then everybody raises their glass filled with champagne or your favorite non-(Continued on page 9)

In his 20 Aubrey-Maturin novels, Patrick O'Brian single-handedly reinvented the historical naval novel, bringing new acclaim and millions of readers to the genre. 

(Boat Denaming; Continued from page 7) alcoholic beverage and shouts, "TO THE SAILORS OF OLD – TO [new name of your boat]." Everybody takes a sip.

Continue reading. "The moods of the sea are many, from tranquil to violent. We ask that this ship be given the strength to carry on. The keel is strong and she keeps out the pressures of the sea." Again the glasses are raised, and the assemblage shouts, "TO THE SEA – TO THE SAILORS OF OLD – TO THE SEA!" and everybody takes another sip.

Continue. "Today we come to name this lady [new name of your boat], and send her to sea to be cared for, and to care for the [name of your family] family. We ask the sailors of old and the mood of God that is the sea to accept [new name of your boat] as her name, to help her through her passages, and allow her to return with her crew safely." Again, with the raising of the glasses, "TO THE SEA – TO THE SAILORS BEFORE US – TO [new name of your boat]." A last, a long sip by all.

Now pour champagne over the bow to appease King Neptune, and lay a branch of green leaves on the deck to ensure safe returns. (Breaking the bottle across her prow is optional for a recreational vessel, and should be done only if all safety precautions have been taken, and after the bottle has been properly scored for a clean break).

What in the world does all this have to do with boating safety? Well, I guess it all depends on how superstitious you are. And there's no endeavor that carries with it more superstition than that of going off to sea.
