FBYC BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS March 13 2008

Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Commodore Ric Bauer.



REAR COMMODORE – **C. MAYO TABB, JR.** LOG – Jim Morrison and

Ric Bauer met with a printing company



representative to discuss options for a color Log. After Jim presented four different options for a 16page Log, the Board approved a motion to proceed with contract dis-

cussions for the option that includes six color pages plus one primary color per page and 10 black and white pages.

HOUSE – Ken Odell reported that screen porch repairs have begun on the main clubhouse. Painting and power washing will start next week, followed by new screen the following week. The logo on the upstairs floor has been repainted.

DOCKS – David Hinckle reported that 18 pilings on the Jackson Creek docks were replaced and Ken Odell disposed of the old pilings. The lift on the Fishing Bay side has been repaired. Allan Heyward has created a visiting yacht registration form to be completed by transient boat owners who tie up at club docks.

GROUNDS – Charles Lytton is moving toward finalizing a contract that incorporates all grounds services. Spring Clean-Up Day is scheduled for March 29.

MEMBER-AT-LARGE – Preparation for crew training continues. Allan Heyward has had good participation from skippers in volunteering to help fill out the teaching spots and in taking trainees out for the on-the-water training.



LONG RANGE PLAN-NING – Noel Clinard discussed Phase 2 and 3 of the pool project, which includes a pool pavilion and new pump house. He advised that the committee to determine what

was needed in the pool area was chaired by Lud Kimbrough and the committee members included the Flag Officers, Ken Odell, Alex Alvis, Valerie Hubbard, Brynn Moody, Carolyn Davis, Evie Scott and Strother Scott.

The committee met on January 28, February 26 and March 11. The preliminary plans, drawn up by Alex Alvis, were presented to the Community Advisory Board on March 8 and were accepted by that group with no objections. Alex presented the architectural drawings to the Board for discussion. Questions about the time frame for completion of the project and the estimated cost were raised. Ric Bauer believes the project can be finished by the time the pool opens for the season. Ken Odell will help with the permitting process and will take the plans to the County as soon as they are ready. Ric plans for much of the construction to be done by club volunteers; however, there are some jobs that will require outside contractors. Mason Chapman reported that funding for the project is available in this year's budget. After motion duly made and seconded, the motion to have the club obtain the required permits and proceed with the construction within the approved budget was passed by the Board.

WEBMASTER – Strother has updated the "CrewFinder" and "Submit Photos" links on the web site to 2008. In addition, he has set up a "Classified Ads" link that includes three categories: (1) Boats for Sale, (2) Boats – Wanted to Buy and (3) Other Items for Sale – Rent or Wanted to Buy.

PUBLICITY — Press releases announcing the crew training program were distributed by Valerie Hubbard to members of the Richmond media as well as Middle Peninsula and Northern Neck newspapers and area yacht clubs. Valerie has contacted the Richmond Times Dispatch and Style Weekly about calendar and editorial coverage. Other releases to the media for the year have included notices for the winter program, Safety-at-Sea program and the 2008 racing events schedule.

OPERATIONS MANAGER – Dixon Cole moved the Opti racks that were

near the pool and will determine if the Laser racks can be salvaged when they are moved. He and Mayo Tabb came up with a project list of 60+ projects for Dixon to take care of and a few that will require outside contractors.

The afternoon session on heavy weather sailing and storm tactics will be led by US Sailing instructor, Ralph Naranjo. George needs volunteers for registration and handouts and he also needs to borrow a Power Point projector.

JUNIOR DIVISION – Eric Powers advised that registration for Junior Week and OptiKids is available online. Hart Moore, a student at William & Mary, has been hired for the Learn-2-Sail program and will be involved in all aspects of junior instruction, including the YMCA course.

SAILING FLEET LT. – Jay Buhl reported that boat hulls were okay before the high winds during the weekend of March 8 and 9 and he will do an inventory to determine if any boats were damaged. Noel Clinard had suggested that tie-downs be put in the small boat parking lot; however, that cannot be done without first determining where underground electrical lines are buried. Stickers have been received and will be placed on all club boats.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m.

Farewell Bill Buckley, Renaissance Sailor

Conservative author and columnist William F. Buckley Jr., passed away February 27, 2008 at age 82 at his home in Stamford Connecticut while fittingly composing at his word processor. Aside from his many accomplishments on the national scene which will not be reiterated here, he was also a passionate life-long sailor. A racer in his early years, by 1972 he had gravitated solely to cruising to which he devoted much of his precious leisure time in later life. This passion for sailing during his lifetime was reflected in his ownership of five sailboats, four transoceanic trips, and multiple races from Newport, Rhode Island, to Bermuda.

A prolific writer of political tomes, it is a little astonishing that he also managed to author a trilogy of sailing bestsellers: Airborne: A Sentimental Journey (Macmillan, 1976), Atlantic High: A Celebration (Doubleday, 1982), and Racing through Paradise: A Pacific Passage (Random House, 1987).

As a consummate capitalist, we are fortunate that Buckley's philosophy compelled him to produce entertaining books about his sea ventures that were unashamedly intended to finance the expense of his voyages. These books did not offer the usually fare of suffering and deprivation afloat, but were instead homages to the joy of sailing in comfort with family and friends interspersed with fascinating social and political anecdotes about his rich life experiences. Much of his nautical prose was pounded out on a typewriter in his cabin when not on watch to avoid the loss of even one single productive moment of time. To quote him directly on his obsessive work habits, "I get satisfaction of three kinds. One is creating one is the feeling that I haven't just been sitting on my ass all afternoon."

Buckley was no Spartan sailor. He raised evebrows back then because his boats were equipped with the latest video equipment to view movies on trans-Atlantic voyages when this technology was not ubiquitous as it is today. He provisioned the finest wines and a store of gourmet foods to nourish his crews. Although it has been years since I read Airborne, perhaps the best of the three books and destined to be a classic, I can still recall a memorable dissertation on why wall-to-wall carpet



was an appropriate amenity on a blue water vessel. A Renaissance man and accomplished musician as well, he provided Cyrano, his 60-foot ketch, a piano which he played for his personal enjoyment and, presumably, for that of his crew during his 4,400 mile voyage to Spain as recounted in Airborne.

"...the evening was so pleasant," Buckley wrote, "the late afternoon sail so exquisite, the sun sight so perfect, the wind so regular (temperature just right), I played the piano a bit before dinner. Not easy," Buckley continues, "because when the boat rocks I need to exert great pressure through my knees on the underside of the keyboard to keep from falling over backward, and the additional challenge to

something, one is being paid for it, and coordination is enough to make the sounds that result a travesty on the Bach partita I am, as usual, struggling with. I left the piano and put on the cassette player, a late Beethoven sonata, as we sat down for a dinner of turkey and stuffing, wine, cheese, fruit and coffee. I thought I would try -- just a flyer -- to say something about the difference between the late and the early Beethoven...."

> Buckley devoted one remarkable chapter in Airborne to the demystification of sextant navigation for the reader. His treatise propounded that traditional instruction was often so

complex and arcane that many became convinced that they did not have the patience or intelligence to master the skill. Buckley's approach was different in that he broke the process down into a logical sequence of simple tasks that would produce an accurate running fix using sun sights without first understanding esoteric theories of celestial mechanics.

And it worked for me. Armed with an inexpensive plastic sextant, H.O.249 sight reduction tables, and a form supplied in the book, I was enabled to navigate by the sun, if not the stars. Buckley's explanation preceded the availability of celestial navigation electronic calculators to do all those messy, laborious calculations, so this was a real feat. (Not as great a feat. certainly, as Sir Francis Chichester who sailed on one of his voyages mistakenly leaving his sight reduction tables ashore. His site reductions were done from scratch on blank paper using only his knowledge of spherical geometry,

a feat that must be considered of near Einsteinian proportions.)







Why does a great sailing club even need a swimming pool let alone worry about making it better?



However we'd like to remind everyone that our online registration at www.fbvc.net is far superior (not to mention more environmentally friendly and cheaper) to paper in that it takes a huge load off our volunteers who have to transcribe this data to our system anyway so we can track all of the key entries that help us track payments, t-shirt sizes, not to mention making sure we have sufficient boats, equipment and volunteers to once again make our program the best on the Bay. Moreover, the online approach avoids the potential errors that may creep in when we spend those late nights transcribing data from your paper forms. Push electrons – not paper! Please note that if you do use these paper forms, they include pricing for both members and non-members. you don't use the paper form provided in your copy of the Log. please give it to a friend or neighbor and encourage them sign their children up to join us for some fun on the water this season!

> In using the payment page, we remind you to only enter the number of participants or items in the boxes rather than the dollar amount so you don't sign up and pay for 275 children for Junior Week. It's also important that after you've entered your data and clicked "Register Online Now" that you allow sufficient time for the host computer to process your information and return you to the refreshed screen before proceeding. Doing otherwise may either cancel your registration or cause the system to register your child multiple times - all requiring further (and very fallible) human intervention. Remember that just as in all other aspects of sailing, patience is a virtue.

> Having filled out the online forms and submitted your payment, vou should receive a confirming email shortly thereafter. This message also provides links to the online registration page so that you can return to check or add items to your order. Don't forget you can also see who's registered for the events by going to the "Registration Table" link at the top of the opening junior page and visiting the big beige table that summarizes all key program information and provides you with links that lead to a list of participants under the "See Who's Coming" - to Jun-

registration assuming vou've submitted it online (see what we mean?).

As in prior years, we're doprograms at all levels so that busy working parents can minimize driving time and expenses. However, its important to note that keeping these programs available depends on your support and participation. It's not just dollars that makes these programs go - its also our gains in critical mass that allow us to plan for the future in making sure we have sufficient participation to justify the effort and expense that's require to sustain a well rounded program. This includes every program from Opti Kids through Junior Week through Race Development Team, Race Team Extended and even high school sailing. Since 2004, we have had over 4,000 on-line registrations for events, of which over 2,000 involved payments with credit cards. We have always had an issue that people mistakenly register more than once for the same event, and once or twice we have overbilled people credit cards. But in the last 2 months we have suddenly seen that 12 credit cards have been charged more times than our system reported.

I have been working the last 3 weeks trying to determine the cause of the overbillings. I am happy to report we have found the problem, and fixed it – which was as follows:

When you register on-line at www.fbyc.net the final step in the process requires that our server generate a confirming email to you before it takes you to the final Confirmation web page. The time interval between submitting the registration and the confirmation should be less than 30 seconds, but many of our users, on a completely intermittent basis, have experienced a longer wait time or have seen Zope Errors.

ing email has had to wait in line at or \$6,400 is the record APPROVED our own mail server for sometimes several minutes, and sometimes We have now made adjustments to the Mail Server so there is no queue for our email, and registrations are once again taking 10-20 seconds to complete the final step.

Who would have ever known that email issues were causing double registrations or credit card problems? We know who has been overbilled and have contacted each of them and sent refunds, but you are welcome to check you own records if you wish. I plan to make a web based report that our Treasurer can use to highlight credit card charges actually made which fail to reach our database of transactions in case this happens again.

I have also learned enough

about the inner workings of the registration system that I now see a way to warn those of you who mistakenly enter dollars instead of numbers and charge your credit card for say 350 times \$350 for one Junior Week entry \$122,500, the curcharge to date! Maybe we can stop that too.
