As a carpenter's assistant I learned many things, including how to step and fetch it, quickly. To inspire haste, the old carpenter would say, "Put your hat on backwards and make me think you're coming back." The onrush of winter action at FBYC, like a sprint upwind in a fast mark boat, requires a similar posture. Much is going on this winter, with hard work by Mary, Dixon and many volunteers. There are the usual mid-winter tasks: finalizing the Events Schedule; publishing the Year Book and Sailing Events Book; closing out financial accounts; processing member renewals, payments and yacht registry; moving Junior members to adult membership, planning the Winter Program and Bermuda High Party; organizing training for crews and PROs; bracing for Junior Week registration, hiring Junior Coaches, and obtaining a visa for one of them; winterizing and repairing the club fleet; monthly Membership and Board Meetings; as well as Leukemia Cup meetings, etc. And that doesn't include the special projects like the Special Dock Committee which began meeting this month.

Another Special Committee, chaired by Mayo Tabb, is drafting a policy for private use of club facilities. The policy details for private gatherings, arranged and hosted by a present member, are still emerging. The policy will perpetuate existing anecdotal practices in a more organized fashion, by permitting a limited number of larger exclusive gatherings, such as a wedding reception, in a closed part of the club's facilities, for a reasonable fee plus all related expenses. These few events will be scheduled early each year as part of our calendaring efforts to coordinate with sailing events and give notice to neighbors and members. They will be subject to the same, or more restrictive, requirements for club events, including traffic and parking control, music hour limitations, compliance with ABC laws, water preservation, etc. Facilitating them will be a challenge for volunteers managing our facilities and we seek the cooperation of members who may be inconvenienced. Small, non-exclusive gatherings of members and guests will not be affected. The policy should be complete within the month, as will the club schedule for 2009, so anyone thinking of a large private event this year should contact Mayo Tabb immediately.

On the membership front, we revisited the issue of whether to create a "social" category of membership, but decided not to do so. Among our considerations were the club's mission to promote sailing, pursuant to Article III of the Club Constitution, and the fact that our facilities have little to offer on the social front. We could not charge much for a social membership, so it does not make fiscal or program sense at this time. Most importantly, we recognized that to be fair to regular members,

"social" use would be limited to facilities like the clubhouse and pool, and would have to exclude use of sailing facilities such as slips, docks, and small boat parking. The result could be to create a marooned class of membership, insulated from a transition to activities comprising the core purpose of the club. I myself evolved from Junior parent to One Design and Offshore sailing, and would have had no path to do so had I been a limited social member. As contemplated by our Long Range Plan, we will re-evaluate this concept periodically. If you would like to see a longer statement of the rationale for this decision, I would be happy to share it with you.

We have planned a Winter Program featuring Tucker Thompson on February 20, a Bermuda High Party on March 6, Race Committee Training on March 14, and a program on the 2009 changes to the RRS featuring Rob Overton on March 18. Skippers will want to invite offshore crews for on-water training on March 28, April 4 and 11, following FBYC's classroom training. Protest Committee training will be offered by John McCarthy on March 28, and you are encouraged to go to Hampton YC for his PRO training on February 14-15. The starting sequence has begun.

I am pleased to report that, assuming space is available, the FBYC Awards Dinner will return to The Country Club of Virginia in 2009.

Sadly, Winter has brought the loss of one of our esteemed former Commodores, an enormously skilled sailor, John Hawksworth, who died on New Year's Day. I commend to you the homage by Jere Dennison in this issue.

Meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Commodore Noel Clinard.

REAR COMMODORE – DAVID S. HINCKLE

DOCKS - Tom O'Connell reported that all slips have been rented, including the one closest to the dry sail hoist, and there are nine boats on the Slip Waiting List. Tom met with his Docks Committee recently to review plans from previous committees and to begin putting together plans for a new Fishing Bay dock. Eight committee members and one member of the Community Advisory Board attended the meeting. The time table for building a new dock is about two years.

WINTER PROGRAMS – Den Roberts has confirmed that Tucker Thompson will be available for a winter program to be held on February 20 or 21.

HISTORIAN – Jere Dennison reported that the club's 70th anniversary is May 8, 2009 and he will prepare an announcement for the February or March Log.

VICE COMMODORE – C. MAYO TABB, JR.

FLEET CAPTAIN – Allan Heyward plans to hold Race Committee PRO training on March 14; a new Rules seminar either March 11 or March 18 at the Branch House; and crew training classes in late March and early April. He will notify the Coast Guard of our 2009 racing events. Allan will serve as editor of the Sailing Events Book for 2009.

OFFSHORE DIVISION

Alex Alvis announced that the Offshore Fleet Captains are as follows: PHRF (SPIN) – Jim Snowa; PHRF (NON-SPIN) – Tom Lakin; J-105 – David Clark; and J-24 – Drake Johnstone. Brad Miller has lined up Social Chairs and Rick Klein has lined up PRO's for almost all Offshore events.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION -

Matt Braun announced that the One Design Fleet Captains are as follows: Flying Scot – John Wake; Front Runner – Matt Braun; Laser – Jon Deutsch; Mobjack – Tom Roberts; and Optimists – Conrad Roos. He will begin his inventory of the boats in the small boat lot as soon as possible. Matt Lambert has about half of the PRO's lined up and Travis Weisleder has all of the Social Chairs lined up for the One Design events.

CRUISING DIVISION – Ed O'Connor reported that there are 14 cruising events planned for 2009 and he has Event Chairs for all of them.

JUNIOR DIVISION – Alison Lennarz reported that the Junior Division has lined up the main coaches and they are in the process of contacting assistant coaches, including some junior parents. They are also working on the registration process and deadlines, the details of which will be available for the February Board meeting and Log.

in Annapolis on May 23 **OLD BUSINESS**

Mayo Tabb advised that he and Jere Dennison chaired a fleet committee set up to make recommendations about our one design fleet provisions as they now exist, determine what to do about the J-24 one design fleet status, suggest fee plans, and address the establishment of one design fleets. The results from that committee are set forth in the following paragraphs.

First, Mayo introduced a Bylaws change relating to the Division of the Yacht Squadron. Upon Motion duly made and seconded, the Board approved the following Bylaws change:

RESOLUTION CHANGING THE DIVISION OF THE YACHT SQUADRON FIND-INGS AND RATIONALE

The MORC rating is no longer in use and should be removed. The J-24 Fleet, which was reinstated in 2000 as an active Offshore One Design fleet, is no longer active and should be changed to a legacy fleet.

RESOLUTION RESOLVED, that the Bylaws be amended so that the Divisions of the Yacht Squadron as it pertains to the Offshore Division reads as follows:

A. Offshore Division

- 1. PHRF rated yachts Yachts holding currently valid PHRF rating certificates issued by PHRF of the Chesapeake, Inc., copies of which are on file with the PHRF Delegate.
- 2. Other rated yachts Yachts of at least 20 feet overall length holding a currently valid rating certificate issued by any other recognized rating authority or one-design class association.

Mayo then discussed changes to the "Establishment and Maintenance of One Design Fleet" as set forth in the Yearbook. The committee changed the "Active

Fleets" section from requirements to guidelines and made the standards more flexible. Active Fleet Captains must promote participation and prepare a report at the end of the sailing season outlining fleet activities and making recommendations about fleet status for the subsequent year. The issue of starts has been moved to the NOR's and the issue of fees will be determined by the Finance Committee. If parking space in the small boat parking lot becomes an issue, parking may be restricted based on participation. The Provisional Fleet was dropped and a Legacy Fleet added. A new "Fleet Maintenance" section was added that calls for an annual Board vote at the end of the sailing season based on reports from the Fleet Captains, Discussion included the possibility of a Portsmouth Fleet. Mayo advised that this will not be included as it is covered in the NOR's. The club has been offering Portsmouth Handicap starts in regattas where three like boats have requested one but it has not been used in recent years. The One Design Fleet Captain will look into increased promotion of this option. Upon Motion duly made and seconded, the Board approved the changes to the "Establishment and Maintenance of One Design Fleets" as recommended and established the fleets for 2009. The active Offshore fleets for 2009 will be PHRF (SPIN), PHRF (NON-SPIN),

and J-105, and the active One Design fleets for 2009 will be Flying Scot, Front Runner, Laser and Optimist. The Legacy fleets for 2009 will be J-24 and Mobjack.

Noel Clinard advised that the committee he appointed to study and establish club policy concerning use of the club-house for private events by members does not have any formal guidelines yet but that the Flag has approved one private function for 2009. Noel would like for the guidelines to be finalized by the February Board meeting so that they can be included in one of the annual books.

There being no additional business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:05 p.m.










FBYC and the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Present Tucker Thompson on February 20

LEARNING THE (NEW) RULES A SEMINAR ON THE 2009-2012 RACING RULES WITH ROB OVERTON

Even if you haven't gotten your copy of the newly minted 2009-2012 Racing Rules of Sailing from US Sailing, you are probably aware that, among other changes, some significant changes have been made in the really fun part of the Racing Rules: "Part 2, When Boats Meet, Section C, At Marks and Obstructions". Just when you thought you had finally mastered Rules 18-20, the game has changed – or maybe not so much: did the continuing obstruction rule ever apply to make a racing boat a continuing obstruction? We are fortunate to have Rob Overton coming in March to tell us what we need to know about the new stuff and how and why it came about, as well as to refresh our understanding of the parts that haven't been rewritten.

Rob is uniquely qualified to do the job. He is one of the coauthors of the new Part 2, Section C, he has been on the US Sailing Racing Rules Committee since 1993, he was involved in the major revision of the Rules in 1997, and he served as Chairman of the Racing Rules Committee from 1997-2000. Yeah, but he lives on his boat and cruises fulltime - what does he know about what goes on on the race course? Quite a bit: he is also member of the International Sailing Federation (ISAF) Team Race Call Book Working Party and an International Umpire with an active schedule of events. Some of you may recall meeting Rob when he actively sailed Lasers and J-24s on the Southern Bay in the 1980s and 1990s. Sure, you could just read Rob's posts on the UK Halsey website and the various other discussions of the new rules on the web and in the magazines, but you'd miss the unique opportunity to spend an evening face to face with one of the authors and an international umpire, to ask questions, argue your own views, and sharpen your understanding of the Rules in preparation for the 2009 racing season. Rob suggested a long midweek evening in Richmond with a break for refreshments, in order to do the subject and the audience justice, so that is what we have arranged. Enrollment is limited to 70, so sign up soon.

We are lucky to see the return of a familiar face with Alejandro Cloos, who will return to Fishing Bay to coach Lasers for the 2009 season. He will be joined by Peter Strong, the Director and Optimist Coach at the U.S. Sailing Center of Martin County, Florida, and an Optimist National Team Coach and our own exceptional sailor and instructor, Cori Radkte. During Junior Week, the coaching staff will be enhanced as usual by a talented and dedicated group of volunteer instructors. While some have been contacted and have committed, we are still looking for more volunteer instructors. As a reminder, the Junior Program commences with OptiKids, scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, June 13-14 and June 20-21. Race team will also be on the water gearing up and honing skills on those weekends. Junior Week will immediately follow, from June 22 to June 26. Sailors will have a great opportunity to implement the skills learned during Junior Week in the FBYC Summer Junior Regatta on Saturday, June 27, and in the Junior Regatta later in the summer, as well as at many regattas throughout the Chesapeake Bay and beyond. The Opti Development Team ("ODT"), which is entering its second year, offers an excellent opportunity for instruction and fun for those wishing to continue racing throughout the summer. The Racing Team is an exceptional experience for committed sailors and their parents and has several slots open.

We are in the process of updating the FBYC web pages and registration forms. On-line registration will commence February 1, 2009. Please note that, due to class size limitations and the number of club boats available, we must regretfully impose certain restrictions. Non-members wishing to use an FBYC Opti for the Beginner Opti Class may register on-line at any time but will not be guaranteed an FBYC Opti before April 1, subject to the availability of a Club boat. Participants in the Intermediate and Racing Opti classes must obtain their own boats; FBYC Optis will not be used for these classes. Prior to May 15, 2009, a participant wishing to register for a class which has reached capacity may only do so with the coordinated approval of the Junior Division Commander and the Lt. Junior Division Commander.

Homage to Johnny Hawksworth Jere Dennison

Johnny Hawksworth, born in 1941, joined the Fishing Bay Yacht Club in 1954 as an Unattached Junior. His family, which owned and eventually subdivided Stove Point, sold our predecessor, the Urbanna Yacht Club, its original Fishing Bay property on December 31, 1948. The Hawksworths occupied the white frame house to the east of FBYC and later a house on Tobacco Cove. Although the family was not inclined to join FBYC, Johnny, as a young teenager, was recruited to sail as crew by his mentor, Ralph C. Lynn, in the high performance Uffa Foxdesigned Jollyboat for which a racing fleet of this international class had organized in the mid-1950s. The attached photo pictures Johnny at age 17 and a younger Drew Sinnickson as crewmen aboard Ralph's Jolly while frostbiting in the fall of 1958. These early racing experiences sparked Johnny's indomitable passion for sailing throughout his life.



Later Johnny campaigned his own Jolly, US 812 *Bucker*, and became the guy to beat in races throughout Chesapeake Bay and mid-Atlantic regions. In 1970, he won a series of match races in a series known as Australia Bound to win the right to represent FBYC in the Jollyboat Worlds in Melbourne Australia. So much was he admired in Australia, Johnny still counts friends and has maintained contact with members of the Port Melbourne Yacht Club.

In 1974, Johnny was named skipper of FBYC's entry in the Lloyd Phoenix Regatta hosted by the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis. Sailed in the Academy's fleet of Luders 44 Yawls, this invitational event was then intended as a competition between Chesapeake area yacht clubs and was rarely won by a lower Bay club. Johnny and his other FBYC crewmembers won this prestigious series for the first and only time in club history. It has since evolved into US Sailing's National Offshore Championship.

His first offshore yacht was a Pearson 26, but he really hit his stride in 1979 after purchasing the redhulled J24, US 170 Basic Transportation. Johnny was instru-



mental in establishing and promoting a very active J24 O/D fleet in the 1980s. Again he was leading the pack and accumulating a mountain of silver. *Basic Transportation* is depicted prominently in John Barber's popular "Spinnaker Reach" print that constitutes the club's Barber Trophy. Although not in the lead, he is shown close astern of the J24 *Pearl* in the foreground.

Johnny Hawksworth's name adorns many of our perpetual trophies.

Commodores Bowl – 1968, 1981 Henry E. Hutcheson, Jr. Memorial Trophy – 1965, 1967, 1968, 1969, 1970 Nott Memorial Trophy – 1983, 1984 Hicks Trophy – 1967, 1968, 1969 Offshore Division Championship Trophy – 1984 Barber Trophy – 1992 Matthew Fontaine Maury Bowl – 1983

The Maury Bowl for outstanding contribution to sailing was awarded jointly to Johnny Hawksworth and Kenzie Hubard. As Co-Junior Activities Chairmen, they first formatted the successful Junior Week program in the early 1980's that still exists and thrives today. The 1984 Junior Week picture nearby shows Johnny first on the left of the bottom row with Kenzie directly beside him. Many of our current members, both adults and former juniors, fill out the rows behind them.

Johnny served as Commodore of FBYC in 1986, Vice Commodore 1985, Rear Commodore 1984, Junior Activities Co-Chair 1982, 1983, and Protest Chairman 1981. Following his term as Commodore, he served for two years as Member-at-Large, 1987 & 1988, the extra year to substitute for Past Commodore Bill Perkins who was unable to fill this position due to impaired health. Additionally, Johnny was our CBYRA Delegate 1988 through

1990 and was elected a Life Member in 1999.

In 2000, he purchased a powerboat to explore places on the Bay he had not been able to get to on a sailboat.

Although not active at FBYC for the last 10 - 15 years due to business and personal exigencies, Johnny Hawksworth must be considered one of the more important and accomplished members in our club's history. And his memory will live on.





