


FROM THE QUARTERDECK

OCTOBER 2009



Last month, I wrote of posting an informal Fishing Bay dock concept at the Annual One Design to provoke discussion, although neither the Special Dock Committee or the Board has formally proposed or approved any design. Having gotten some comments, I continue the dialogue in this column to encourage our focus on One Design needs and their relevance to FBYC's sailing Mission. These are my own views, not those of the Board or Committee, but they are leavened with 10 years of exposure to this issue.

The Fishing Bay ramps, beach and dock are the waterfront facilities for our One Design and Junior Divisions, just as the creek side serves the needs of the Cruising and Offshore Divisions. But, the existing dock/launching facility falls far short of meeting our One Design needs, and its improvement is part of our Long Term Plan. Now, only 7 to 10 boats can be launched and tied to the east side of the dock before other launchers pile up in the parking lot, especially in a southerly wind, aligning the boats with the dock. It is extremely difficult to maneuver boats onto the end of the dock, especially in wind, and practically impossible to get them to the west side, which is also impeded by piling or lift obstructions. As we saw at the Annual One Design, this year and last, non-competing boats often unknowingly moor on the dock's east side or end and block this severely restricted area. So, we desperately need much more lateral space, *somewhere* alongside the dock.

Other site constraints limit our options. Much of our water frontage is already taken by ramps, pool bulkhead/ steps, and the existing dock, and we wish to preserve remaining beach for Juniors and member recreation. The concave shoreline causes the property lines and navigable water for us and our neighbors to converge in pie shaped areas, limiting options for dock length and configuration. A shallow accreting bottom further tightens our launch/recovery by precluding sailing away from anything but the outer third of the dock. Given permitting constraints, it is not realistic to think we can solve our problem by a simplistic infinite lengthening of the dock into Fishing Bay in any manner consistent with stewardship of our relations with our neighbors and the community.

This conundrum has sorely separate FBYC challenged three committees for over a decade. Ten years ago a committee proposed a dock replacement on the west half of the concrete ramp. In 2003, another committee presented a similar design, approved by the Board for pricing. Both designs contemplated launching on both sides of the dock with two hoists. But, Hurricane Isabel destroyed the existing dock, later replaced by insurance, thereby burdening our planning with a new dock in the old location/configuration, with all its inadequacies, and putting the project on hold, now for 6 years. Accordingly, the current committee has struggled with a *fait accompli*, wrestling with solutions to incorporate the "new" post-Isabel dock.

All three committees have advocated platforms onto which trailered boats (but not member vehicles) could be hand-rolled to hoists, lifting boats to both sides of the dock. Our traveling sailors have found similar small boat hoists at almost 20 leading sailing clubs, and there are, no doubt, many others. Traveling sailors hate ramp launching, which jeopardizes their trailer hubs, especially in salt water. Also, many sailors in our One Design demographic are getting a bit old for safely tight-rope walking their trailer frames or aerobically winding their winches during ramp launching. During our 2007 NACs, a substantial number of visiting Scots (about 40%) asked for launching at our creek side hoist (feasible then on the creek side only because the sailing area for that event was off the mouth of Jackson Creek, not in Fishing Bay).

These material hoist advantages aside, the critical inducement for hoists on the Fishing Bay dock is to facilitate launching boats to *both* sides of the dock, significantly increasing lateral capacity alongside it, even before any other enhancement is considered. In short, hoists play a critical role in keeping our One Design facilities competitive for serving our own fleet and attracting new members and visitors, while helping to solve our capacity problem within permitting constraints and to accomplish our mission of supporting the sport of sailing.

SECRETARY - George Burke did not hold a membership meeting this month but there will be a meeting held on October 6.

TREASURER – Chip Hall presented the Treasurer's Report and also gave a recap of the Junior Program receipts and expenses. The net expense for the Junior Program is under budget. There have not been any large capital expenditures this year; however, the bulkhead project that was postponed earlier in the year will be completed this winter.

LONG RANGE Lud Kimbrough advised that he will try to schedule a Community Advisory Board meeting to be held before the end of September. Tom O'Connell would like to hold another Special Docks Committee meeting prior to the CAB meeting.

WEB – Strother Scott reported that Jon Deutsch has set up a FBYC Facebook Fan Page that now has 108 members.

FLEET CAPTAIN – According to the new Rules pertaining to the Establishment and Maintenance of One Design Fleets, the Offshore and One Design Fleet Captains must prepare a report for the Offshore and One Design Division Commanders relating to fleet activity for the year with their recommendation as to fleet status for their particular fleet for the upcoming year. The reports must be prepared and sent to the Division Commanders prior to the Board vote at the November meeting regarding fleet status for the next year.

OFFSHORE DIVISION – Alex Alvis thanked David Hinckle for an excellent job chairing the Stingray Point Regatta this past weekend. There were 35 boats that competed. The Fall Series races get underway with the Wolf Trap Race.

ONE DESIGN DIVISION - Matt Braun reported only moderate participation for the Fall Series #1 races because of the absence of Flying Scots. The Indian Summer Regatta will take place on October 3.

CRUISING DIVISION – Ed O'Connor reported that eight boats/31 people went on the Corrotoman River Cruise. Eight boats are registered for the September 19-25 Mid Bay Cruise that will be immediately followed on September 26-27 with the Annual Crab Feast and Weekend Cruise. The final event of the season is the Wilton Creek Cruise.

JUNIOR DIVISION – Jay Buhl reported that the Richmond High School Sailing Association that was recently formed has been VISA recognized. The RHSSA is sponsored by FBYC and Deep

Run High School and there are six FBYC sailors participating. The 2010 coaches have been hired and they are Alejandro Cloos (Laser Team), Diego Ravecca (Opti Team) and Cori Radtke (ODT). Fifteen juniors have already signed up for the 2010 Race Team. Jay has begun 3-year succession planning for the Junior Organization Structure and he has also submitted a 3-year Junior powerboat plan to the Finance Chair.

TROPHIES – John Hubbard advised that the request for perpetual trophy nominations is in the September Log and there will be a meeting following the October Board meeting to go through the nominations to determine recipients.

NEW BUSINESS – Ric Bauer reported that a donation has been made to the Deltaville Maritime Museum for the Marty Hawksworth Greenhouse Project in appreciation of the use of their tractor that was used to launch boats at the Annual One Design Regatta. Wilton Cottage Garden Center and Delta Marine Construction also contributed tractors

Noel Clinard reminded Board members that there will be a private party held at the club on September 19.

OLD BUSINESS Noel reminded Board members that budget recommendations should be completed and posted as soon as possible. Annual Reports should be prepared and posted by the last week in October.

There being no additional business. the meeting was adjourned at 6:55 p.m.

QUARTERDECK (continued)

Granted, our Main Clubhouse and Pool are situated on the Fishing Bay side of our campus with splendid views. This imbues us with a special duty to improve, but protect, this sanctuary and its trees, while accommodating core One Design needs. The hoist design posted at the recent event, and shown here, was conceptual only and not to scale, to illustrate the functionality of hoists (note that this drawing shows small green tractor or golf cart vehicles on the platform, but cars/trucks would not be permitted). This concept would fit largely within the footprint of the existing "L" shaped walkway from the concrete ramp to the existing dock, filling in some of the useless area inside that "L" with a platform, possibly increasing safety from falling in that area but without occupying precious usable beach. The main change contemplated by this concept is the hoists, which would be much smaller than the Jackson Creek hoist and have a capacity of only 2,000 pounds. The Committee and Board have work to do to make the hoist platform a multi-purpose one for greater waterfront enjoyment by members (think deck chairs and tables when not in use for

launching) and to select and position the hoists as aesthetically as possible. Please give the Committee your support and patience while they pin this down with our One Design sailors, our neighbors and the permitting authorities. You'll hear more as this goes forward.



8 FBYC MOBJACKS COMPETE IN 50TH NATIONALS

Eight Fishing Bay Mobjacks competed in the 50th Mobjack National Championship Regatta held August 21-23 at Ware River Yacht Club in Gloucester, VA. Three placed in the top 5, including defending National Champion Len and Heidi Guenther, 2nd; Case Whittemore and Ken Read 3rd and Jerry Desvernine and Josh Guenther 5th. Case Whittemore earned the Senior National Champion award, pulling ahead of Jim Rice in



the final race. We also had three boats in the second five, Tom and Sam Roberts, Meg and Tom Roberts and Russ Collins with Alec Goss. Also competing from Fishing Bay were Matt Lambert sailing with Chris Tulip and Brooks Zerkel assisted by Miles Turner. In all, eighteen boats competed and the regatta was won by Mark Arnold and Matt Frank of Broad Bay Sailing Association. Tom and Sam Roberts won the Family Award which meant Tom has now won it with every member of his family. Justin Ailsworth won the Ulmer Award sailing in his first Nationals. IMA Past President Meg Roberts won the Female Skipper Award and her crew Tom Roberts was awarded the Sportsmanship Trophy. The keeper awards were a framed commemorative print "50 years of Mobjacks" made especially for the event by artist and skipper Meg Roberts.

The three day regatta resulted in 9 races, the most ever in a Mobjack Nationals, in spite of coming off the water at 12:30 on Saturday and losing the afternoon to storms. There were four races on Friday in stiff breezes resulting in several capsizes, then two on Saturday and three on Sunday in lighter wind graced by the reliable Mobjack Bay sea breeze coming up the Ware River. Competition was sharp and the "I" flag was used in several starts.

The Regatta was run to near perfection by PRO John Ritter of Langley Yacht Club assisted by Rick Klein, Robert Bowles, Blackwell Nottingham, Mike Dale, Doug Anderson all from Fishing Bay and others from Ware River YC. Several folks who have raced Mobjacks over the years joined us for a reunion dinner Saturday evening, some from long ago, some more recent, all renewing friendships and fond memories of the fun and good times in Mobjacks and with the folks who sail them.

CLOSING DAY REGATTA: October 24




