THE YEAR AHEAD

I am honored and grateful to have the opportunity to serve as FBYC's Commodore in 2017. While my family and I do not have nearly as long tradition of membership as many of you, we have been fortunate to raise our children on Fishing Bay and to benefit from the Club's world

class junior program, cameraderie and facilities.

As in each previous year, we have new incoming Board and Committee members who have volunteered to be stewards of the Club's assets. This year's Board is quite different from past Boards: we have eight new members, more women (14 in total) than in the recent past, and interests that scan the entire spectrum of Club activities. When you see one of these Board or Committee members, please thank them for their service. They spend countless hours throughout the year ensuring we all have a great experience and ample opportunity to enjoy a lifelong sport we love. Their names and positions are included in this edition of the Log.

Most of you have by now heard about the proposal to replace our East dock with a new floating dock. Many of you have attended the Club's three "town hall" meetings held over the summer and into the fall. The Flag has listened to your many comments (in person and by email), and a number of revisions have been made to the plan. Based on sound reasoning and the desire to upgrade our docks to the caliber of the rest of our top-notch facilities and programs, the Flag is in favor of moving forward, with caution and due diligence, with this plan. Please read the enclosed article written by Member-At-Large Ted Bennett. We hope that members will understand that the docks are an asset of the entire membership, and we will have to use Club resources to maintain and improve them.

Our assets, particularly our facilities, have been well-managed by Dixon Cole, who has served FBYC exceptionally well over the past 12 years. Change, however, is inevitable and often necessary to re-focus, re-energize and recommit to a common cause. Dixon will reduce his schedule in 2017, but continue to serve the Club as Maintenance Supervisor. Dixon is a master at fixing things big and small; we are fortunate to have his dedication and expertise and all should thank him for his continued service.

Other changes are in store for the coming year. Earlier in 2016, former Commodore David Hinckle led a Long-Range Planning Committee in examining the management structure of the Club. FBYC is unique in that it relies heavily on many volunteers to run events, maintain its facilities and oversee our financial well-being. The time has come to allow members to enjoy the Club to the fullest. We will still rely on volunteers and continue to be a laidback beautiful Club on a sleepy part of the Chesapeake Bay. We will still be governed by a volunteer Board and Committee members. But going forward, we will have the time and talent of a General Manager to help us attract new members, and to add value so we retain existing members. We have lots of plans for this person, but we welcome your suggestions as to how to improve our Club and the role that a new General Manager can play in accomplishing this goal. A search committee has been hard at work since September, and we expect to fill the position in the coming weeks. Look for more news about this on the Club website and in the next issue of the Log.

Meanwhile, many volunteers have been busy working on various winter-time projects: finalizing our 2017 budget, planning the upcoming sailing season, forming membership initiative subcommittees and preparing to publish our Sailing Events and Yearbook – and of course planning various winter events, including the Bermuda High party. **David Lennarz - Commodore**

MINUTES - November 2016

FISHING BAY YACHT CLUB - BOARD MEETING Preliminary Minutes - November 10, 2016

SECRETARY -

Minutes: Recommended amendment to the minutes:

- 1. FLEET CAPTAIN Reported that the Coast Guard contacted him to confirm that the Club is holding races according to the schedule.
- 2. Under New Business:
- Added "officers and" to indemnification provision
- Removed "volunteers" from indemnification provision
- Edited motion to: A motion was made to approve and recommend to members the amendment and restatement of the Articles of Incorporation per the attached resolutions. The Amended and Restated Articles approved by the Board will be sent out to members who have a yacht enrolled with the club for their vote: Proxy, Resolution and Articles.

TREASURER – Asked all members to get all expected reimbursements for the year as soon as possible so that 2016 can be closed out.

HOUSE CHAIR – Reported the following: Minor repairs to Fannie's exterior (roofing, screens, siding) – not to exceed \$5,000 (and may be much less)

DOCKS CHAIR – Received revised pricing for the replacement of the eight whalers: \$10,920 (vinyl coated); \$8,400 (non-vinyl coated). Flag inspected and approves the work. After some discussion, a motion was made to accept the quote of \$10,920 for the vinyl coated whalers; motion was seconded and approved. Also, depending on the weather, the water to the docks will be turned off November 21st or 28th.

SOCIAL CHAIR – 154 dinners have been sold for the Commodore's Ball. Costs will be reviewed after the event for next year.

GROUNDS CHAIR -

- 1. **Grounds**: The sod/parking project will provide temporary storage along the east side pool fence. The project will begin soon. November will include trimming the hedge in front of Fannie's, over-seed the campus and limb removal. The dumpster privacy doors need some attention. The backing on the rear of the two doors is in poor shape and need to be replaced. Winterization of the East Bathhouse is scheduled for November. Fall cleanup was scheduled for Saturday, November 19th, with a backup date of Saturday, December 3rd.
- 2. **Barn**: One gate has been installed; the second has been delivered and is awaiting installation.
- Pool and Pavilion: Covers have been installed on the pools

LONG RANGE PLANNING – Search for the General Manager continues with more than 60 resumes having been received. The interview process will begin next week.

WEB MASTER -

- 1. **New Registration System**: We dropped the Legacy Zope Registration in October for Django registration, and it is working well. The payment system, Stripe, is showing some delay on the buyer's side (up to two weeks) for refunds. However, on vendor side, Stripe sends money every few days, which may enable more real-time accounting for FBYC bookkeeping between credit card receipts and cash revenue.
- 2. **Technology Developments**: Anthony Burton, an FBYC member who lives in Charlottesville and sails a Laser and crews with David Clark, has been a member of the web committee since it started. He has come forward and asked if he can do programming for the FBYC website. Strother has permission from the Flag to hire him and the cost will come out of the website budget. He has been given a website design problem to solve. Today, if you look at new.fbyc.net on a narrow screen like a iPhone all you see at the top is WHITE SPACE and the "hamburger" menu.

YAM CHAIR –Events for 2017 are already in the works.

ONE DESIGN DIV. CDR. – Reported that the final Laser event had 10 boats participating. Awards will be mailed out. He is pleased with the innovation of the Laser Race Committee which experimented with "no race committee" and an "end of dock" race committee. Also made a motion to remove the Front Runners from probation due to their increased participation. This motion was seconded and approved. Suggestions for 2017 include new possible fleets be looked at and the Flying Scot fleet needs to be fostered. Jon was thanked for all his hard work over the years on the Board.

CRUISING DIV LT. CDR. – Reported that the Closing Dinner was well-attended. The Cruising Division is already well into planning the 2017 season and they look forward to working with the Adult Sailing Program/Karen Soule on various overlapping workshops and events.

A DOCK FOR OUR FUTURE BY TED BENNETT

In 2014, your Board commissioned a study of our entire waterfront facilities by a professional engineering firm that specializes in marine structures. As a result of this study, we made repairs and some improvements. A key finding of this report is that the East and Middle docks will likely need replacing within approximately 10 years. In response to this finding, two study committees were formed under the leadership of Docks Chairman, David Clark.

In 2015, the first committee considered members' complaints of our existing timber docks. The committee determined replacement of our Jackson Creek docks with floating docks as a logical goal. Given the magnitude of the plan, it was determined that a phased approach starting with the East dock was the most achievable concept. Key factors in this decision were: 1) Fixed wooden docks have a lifespan of 25 years compared to 35-40 years for floating; 2) Floating docks provide an environment of superior safety for boats and the people who use them; 3) The east dock is most vulnerable to storm damage and is in the worst condition following the recent middle dock repairs.

Then in 2016, the second committee looked at all potential replacement options, including taking advantage of this opportunity to redesign a new East dock that would better serve the membership. It was determined that a floating dock by Meeco-Sullivan, constructed with polyethylene floats and a 35-40 year expected life span hardwood deck using fiberglass pilings, was the best in terms of both price and service life. Other important design factors include moving the dock 35 feet to the east to provide a proper width fairway, and keeping the same number of slips on the new dock (28 plus 2 transient). The chart below breaks down the costs in 2016 prices for this project and shows that a floating dock will cost an additional \$86,000 over building the new redesigned dock out of timber.

The total East dock project is currently estimated to cost \$450,000. Can we afford paying \$450,000 for a replacement dock? For a number of reasons, my answer is yes. In addition to safety, ease of use and favorable lending environment (for now), a new floating dock will drive incremental revenue to the Club. The new east dock slips are currently estimated to rent for \$87.50/foot

yearly; for example, a 40 foot sailboat now pays \$2,200/ year and instead would pay \$3,500/year on the floating dock. We already have verbal commitments from 28+ members for these slips, and these boats will generate approximately \$35,000 more per year over the current income for the east dock. This additional revenue will go a long way toward making this project self-funding and, once any debt is paid off, create extra revenue that can go toward replacing the Middle dock or any other use the Board deems appropriate at that time.

Early in the coming year, the Board will be asked for approval to move forward in preparing the necessary permits. It should be noted that the approved permit has a ten year shelf life (if an extension is exercised). Once the permits are approved, a royalty fee will be due to the Virginia Marine Resources Commission. Later in the year, the Board will be asked to approve financing of the project. 2017 CRUISING DIVISION PLANS BY JOHN GALLOWAY

Planning for our upcoming Cruising season is well underway, including an innovative proposal for a "Vagabonds Cruise" led by George and Lyons Burke. This cruise will include up to four specific cruise destination/rendezvous points located on both shores of the Chesapeake Bay, with the northern most spot being Georgetown on the Sassafras River, and possibly as far south as Hampton. It will operate like a sailing rally, with boats able to choose to meet up at as many (or as few) locations as they like. Skippers and crews will have the flexibility to decide what interim stops they might prefer based on their own interests, schedules, and weather concerns, prior to arriving at the rendezvous destinations at a given time slot.

For those that chose to sail to all of the rendezvous points, they will complete an "Inside the Bay" circumnavigation over a three to four week period! We are looking to start this cruise around the beginning of June.

We are also tentatively planning an early June cruise to the Patuxent River Naval Air Station, which would include overnighting at the Navy marina, and a behind the scenes tour of the Air Station, including the Commanding Officer's house. This cruise could be done as a feeder into the longer Vagabonds Cruise, or as a "there and back" destination cruise on its own.

Our **Welcome Cruisers Party** is scheduled for **Saturday, April 8**, and our first cruise of the year should again be to the Mathews Yacht Club for their annual Flag Raising ceremony and dinner/dance in early May. We are considering a variety of other three to four-day Destination Cruises over the season – possible locations including Onancock, Cape Charles, and the St. Mary's River – as well as closer to home weekend Captains Choice Cruises.

As a new initiative, we are looking to team with the Adult Sailing program to offer a number of cruising-oriented training seminars, which could include both classroom and some on-water sessions. Topics may include Marine Weather, Hands-on Diesel Basics, Electrical Troubleshooting, Docking and Line Handling, Sail Trim for Cruisers, and a Safety Seminar. Details are still being worked out, and more info will be made available as plans firm up.



FBYC's Opti Race Team won last year's first inaugural Optimist Pram Team Invitational hosted by South Carolina Yacht Club, Hilton Head, SC, so all sights were set on Team FBYC at this year's event, which
